10:15 – 11:45	<p>The Impact of Counter-Terrorism Efforts on Public Safety in an Era of Global Instability</p> <p><i>Description</i> As geopolitical tensions intensify and global instability becomes more pronounced, the nature of terrorism—and the responses to it—continue to evolve. Counter-terrorism efforts are no longer confined to distant threats; they increasingly shape the day-to-day realities of public safety at home.</p> <p>Delivered in partnership with the Canada Border Services Agency, this session will examine how shifting global dynamics are influencing domestic threat landscapes—from the movement of people and goods across borders, to the rise of ideologically diverse extremism and the acceleration of online radicalization. It will highlight the critical role of border security, intelligence-sharing, and inter-agency coordination in identifying and mitigating emerging threats before they materialize within Canadian communities.</p> <p>The discussion will also explore the broader impacts and trade-offs of counter-terrorism strategies, including implications for community trust, resource allocation, and frontline policing priorities.</p>

13:15 – 14:15	<p>E-Crime: Leading in a Borderless Threat Environment</p> <p><i>Description</i> The rapid evolution of cyber-enabled crime is reshaping the policing landscape—challenging traditional investigative models, stretching legal frameworks, and demanding new forms of leadership. As digital threats become more sophisticated and increasingly borderless, the question is no longer whether to adapt, but how quickly and effectively leaders can position their organizations to respond.</p> <p>This session provides a strategic update on the forces shaping the e-crime environment, including advancements in digital forensics, the national coordination role of the E-Crime Cyber Council, and the evolving expectations around lawfully authorized electronic surveillance.</p> <p>More importantly, it will examine what these developments mean for police leaders: how to build and sustain specialized capabilities, navigate complex legal and privacy considerations, and strengthen partnerships across jurisdictions and sectors.</p> <p>Grounded in current realities and focused on what lies ahead, this session will challenge leaders to think differently about structure, investment, and collaboration—ensuring their organizations are not only responding to digital crime but anticipating it.</p>
